

Turners' meeting. Monday, the 3rd October 2022 – from 18h00 at Made in Workshop – Herman demonstrated making a sphericon. A sphericon is a shape that is made from two cones that are joined together so that when it rolls on flat surface all the surfaces in turn make contact with the surface. Herman showed how to join two pieces of wood with a paper joint, turn the two cones and then split them apart and reglue them to make a sphericon.



Wood of the Month – Meranti. Chris van Heeswijk described the family of woods that are called Meranti – Shorea species. A number of species are sold as meranti, but the original, Philippine Mahogany is the species that was most widely used. Up to 196 different species, mostly rain forest trees, are sold as Meranti, to meet world-wide demand. Balau is sold as white meranti, and other colours are dark red, yellow and light red. Some species are endangered. It has the distinction of being the tallest tree in the tropics. Meranti is favoured for joinery to its stability and ease of working.

Main Club meeting, Wednesday, the 12th
October 2022 Graham Swallow
demonstrated making mechanical joints biscuits, dominoes and dowels. Graham
discussed the advantages and disadvantages
of each type. He then showed how to make
examples of each. The picture shows Graham




